

AP[®] Online Scores for Students

Overview for Educators



This July, AP[®] students will get their scores online. Students will not receive scores in the mail.*

Your role as a source of early and accurate information is critical. Included in this kit are resources we hope will be helpful, including a reproducible poster and handout, and scripts for automated telephone outreach and PA announcements. AP Online Scores for Students at a Glance

Before Exams



1. Students should sign up for a free College Board account at apscore.org.

At Exam Time



2. Students will need to provide this information on their first 2013 answer sheet:**

- Their student identifier (student ID number) in field T, if your school uses one.
- Their email address in field U.

After the AP Exams



3. Students will need to remember their College Board account username and password, plus:

- Their AP number, located on the label in the AP Student Pack that students receive at exam time; **OR**
- Their student identifier (student ID number), if they include it on their AP answer sheet at exam time.

4. Students will wait for an email — then receive their scores online:



- Students will receive an email after the exam period letting them know how and when to access their scores. More information will be posted on apscore.org, so everyone should be sure to check back periodically.

Quick Tips

Have students:

- Email their AP number and/or student ID number to themselves.
- Photocopy the AP number card and give one to a parent or guardian.
- File the AP number card in a safe place and email themselves the location.

What's the most important thing for students to do now?



Sign up for a College Board account at apcore.org.

Students will need a College Board account to access their scores online this July. Encourage them to sign up now for an account at apcore.org — it's free. Signing up now will make the process of getting their scores in July smooth and easy. Remind them to keep their username and password in a safe place.

Confirm their College Board account if they have one.

If your students have ever registered for the SAT® or participated in other College Board programs, they may already have a College Board account. Ask your students to confirm their username and password by signing in. Remind them to keep their sign-in information safe so they're ready to access scores in July.

What are the best ways to let students know about this important change?

- Suggestions to encourage account sign-up:
 - Consider making a homework assignment of signing up for a College Board account by going to apcore.org. If students think they already have an account, have them confirm it by signing in. Encourage all students to hold on to their account username and password.
 - Challenge: Get all AP students in your school to sign up for their College Board accounts by a chosen date.
 - Create a contest between AP classes to see which class can get all its students signed up first.
- Make sure students remember apcore.org — students can sign up for their College Board account here. This website also includes information about getting AP scores online and will feature important updates and reminders.
